

Nonfiction Books for Elementary Students

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Class Description:

This course is all about informational books for elementary students (PreK-5th grade). During the four weeks, we'll look at types of informational books, narrative nonfiction, and pairing nonfiction and fiction texts together, and ways of using nonfiction books. Together we will build a database of books that will give you a whole list of options for the next school year.

Class Overview:

This class is all about nonfiction books. We're going to be looking at nonfiction/informational books for PreK-5th grade. During the four weeks, we'll look at types of nonfiction, trends in nonfiction, and pairing nonfiction/fiction together. Together we will build a database of books that will give you a whole list of options for the next school year.

This class is designed to be self-paced and does not require participants complete the work at the same time or participate in activities or discussions at the same time. However, reviewing what your fellow participants post and initiating discussions with them will greatly enhance your learning and overall experience.

Text:

No text is required for this class. Readings will be posted online. Students are encouraged to spend book funds on copies of children's books for their classroom instruction.

Goals & Objectives:

Identify and work together to build a database of the best in children's non-fiction text.

Investigate the different types of nonfiction books.

Explore the current trends in children's nonfiction literature.

Discover ways to share nonfiction books with students.

Design activities to support using nonfiction text.

Participate in course activities to get a deeper understand of children's nonfiction today.

Class Assignments: Instructions are provided for all assignments within the online class modules. These are general descriptions of the expectations.

Module Activities:

Each module will have at least one activity that you will be asked to complete, post your results, and reflect. These activities are assigned so you will have hands-on experience with nonfiction books. In addition, each module will contain a "Professor Pick's" short video in which I will share a few booktalks and ideas for using those new books with students.

Collaborative Children's Nonfiction Database:**

Each week you will need to add at least 3 titles (but can be more) that you read and enjoyed for a minimum of 12 titles by the end of class. These can be any of the types of nonfiction. Each book must be appropriate for Grades PreK-5th grade and must have been published in their last 5 years (2016-2021). There will be a GoogleForm link in Canvas. The form will ask you the basics about the book (title, author, illustrator, publisher, type of nonfiction, etc.) and some ideas about how you might use it with children. (Just reading it aloud for the pleasure of reading is an acceptable answer to that question!). You'll fill out the form for each title. This will create a database that we'll all share, so at the end of the four week all students will leave with a database of new titles to use in your classroom.

** If you will have trouble accessing books from a library due to the pandemic, please let me know and we'll adjust this assignment on a case-by-case basis.

Expand a Title:

Pick a nonfiction appropriate for elementary age students published in the last five years. Design a way to incorporate using that book with students. Use the template provided in Canvas to guide your planning. Make sure to include connections to the Virginia SOLs, include ways to incorporate technology, and consider people in the school you might be able to collaborate with as well. We will post these in a discussion so that everyone can share ideas. We will have a sign-up sheet so there are no duplicates for this assignment.
